Dear Friends of Shore:

What a Groundbreaking Year! Both literally and figuratively, Shore Community Services, Inc. has had quite a year. In 2015, we began major construction on our new home at 8350 Laramie Avenue in Skokie for our Adult Services Program, which is currently housed in our Lois Lloyd Center on Church Street in Evanston. Our administrative offices relocated to the second floor in February 2015. This project helps define our vision of moving Shore forward as a premiere organization serving over 400 adults and children with intellectual and other developmental disabilities. Our dedication to making this new facility the best it can be is a testament to the commitment we have to our persons served and their families to offer the quality services they deserve.

Another successful endeavor that launched in 2015 was a new electronics recycling business called Shore eCycle, which is a proud member of CyclePoint from SourceAmerica, the nation's new eRecycling network that creates sustainable jobs for people with significant disabilities. Some of the persons served at the Joseph Koenig, Sr. Training Center have been trained to safely disassemble and recycle electronics that would otherwise end up as landfill waste. This business has created a new revenue source for the training center in addition to deepening its

presence in the community by offering successful outreach events for neighbors to drop off unwanted electronics. Shore eCycle even uses superior methods to secure data destruction so please consider utilizing their services.

Despite major uncertainty within the State of Illinois and its inability to pass a State budget, Shore has been able to continue all of its programs with no disruption of services even when the State impasse caused a freeze in payments. Shore continues to function with a strong balance sheet and strives for excellence and solvency by being fiscally prudent. The agency received the highest marks in its auditing process and has also received the highest accreditation from CARF International, founded as Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities. CARF International is an independent, nonprofit accreditor of health and human services. In fact, the survey conducted in May marked the 15th consecutive 3-year accreditation Shore has received from this prestigious organization.

Our success despite the ambiguity of State funding is dependent on our wonderful family of supporters. The Annual Appeal was the most successful in our history with over \$180,000 raised and the Second Time Around Thrift & Gift Shop had sales in excess of \$130,000, which both help defray operating costs. Our focus on major gifts has also supported our capital endeavors. This area will continue to be a spotlight in 2016 as we intend to bolster our endowment and operating fund to weather any budget crisis and secure our future for our incredible persons served and their families.

Thank you for your ongoing support of Shore and for helping us make a difference in the lives of such awe-inspiring individuals.

Vocational Programs

hore Joseph Koenig, Sr. Training Center in Morton Grove is a vocational program supporting persons with intellectual and other developmental disabilities ages 16 years and older. The program seeks to enhance the individual's ability to obtain and maintain employment. Objectives include: providing employment, maintaining job performance and improving job-related skills and habits to maximize earning potential. The Center utilizes community job sites and subcontract work from local industries to prepare individuals for employment. A Senior Services Program is also available for individuals (55 or older), who have chosen to retire. This program offers leisure-based and community activities.

- 175 individuals served during the year.
- 49 individuals served in the Community Employment Department, which provides job counseling and placement, community work experience, supported employment and competitive employment.
- Sales for Packaging and Assembly and Shore eCycle reached over \$200,000, which is an 18% increase from Fiscal Year 2014.
- The Center was accepted to participate in CyclePoint from SourceAmerica's electronic recycling program. Three staff attended training for CyclePoint in Virginia in December. The new electronic recycling business is named Shore eCycle and a committee was formed. With the help of the committee and student volunteers from Evanston Township High School, their first Community Recycling Collection Event was held on April 18th. Over 10,000 pounds of electronic recycling materials were collected as of June 30th and 9 persons served have been trained to disassemble items.
- Started working to acquire R2/RIOS certification, which focuses on safety for the worker, the environment and sensitive data. This certification will offer Shore eCycle credibility when bidding on electronic recycling contracts with government entities and businesses.
- Shore is an Employment Network (EN) for the Ticket to Work Program, which
 provides people receiving Social Security benefits more choices for receiving
 employment services. Under this program, the Social Security Administration
 issues tickets to eligible beneficiaries who, in turn, may choose to assign those
 tickets to an EN of their choice to obtain employment services, vocational
 rehabilitation services, or other support services necessary to achieve a
 vocational (work) goal.
- Three rooftop HVAC units installed through a Cook County Community
 Development Block Grant (CDBG); \$1,000 in tools were donated from Stanley
 Black and Decker; computers were purchased for our persons served with a
 \$3,000 grant from the Morton Grove Foundation; an \$800 grant from Rotary
 Club of Skokie Valley was used to purchase equipment for Shore eCycle;
 and Kevin Rauch, a trainee, was selected to be a ComEd Energy Force
 Ambassador and he completed over 10 community presentations on energy
 efficient measures.







Adult Services

The Adult Services Program, which offers developmental training for individuals 18 years and older, is currently located at the Lois Lloyd Center in Evanston. Participants may have multiple disabilities, including: severe/profound to moderate developmental disabilities and other physical and medical challenges. This educational and community integrated program offers a curriculum in the areas of language and communication, adaptive daily living skills, prevocational skills and community life experiences.

- 81 individuals received services.
- 328 community integration activities occurred, including trips to the movies, restaurants, bowling, the Bahai Temple and other points of interest. Persons served presented a fashion show, "Decades of Style" and a play "Super Hero Therapy Group."
- Two groups of students from Northwestern University's McCormick School of Engineering and Applied Science met with staff and designed prototypes for adjustable changing tables, which allow the tables to be moved up and down with ease while transferring persons served.
- 8 Occupational Therapy Assistant students from Wright College completed internships.
- Free monthly dental screenings continued throughout the year by the Illinois Masonic School of Dentistry.









Early Intervention

Early Intervention (EI) serves infants to three-year-olds who are experiencing developmental delays. Shore provides individual and group (occupational, physical, speech, and developmental) therapies and other services in a variety of locations such as our El Center in Skokie, the child's home, or other day care centers. The primary focus of the program is the family, and what is best for the child. Research has demonstrated that working on prevention activities with children at a very young age is much more cost effective than remedial programs at a later age.

- 42 children received services during the year.
- A playgroup continues to integrate occupational and developmental therapy and a second group was added that is lead by a Developmental Therapist who is also a Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist.
- The EI program collaborates with Wilber Wright Junior College's Occupational Therapy Assistant Program, which allows students the opportunity to observe the therapists and help with general office activities.
- National Lekotek, which is an agency that works with young children with developmental delays and collaborates with Shore's El Program, continues to share space at the El Center.
- The El Center was retrofitted to energy efficient lighting.



Residential Services

Residential Services comprises the Community Integrated Living Arrangements (CILAs), Supported Living Arrangements (SLA), In-Home Respite Care and Home Based Support Services (Service Facilitation).

Community Integrated Living Arrangements (CILAs) are homes in the community where two to seven people reside. The Jean F. Karger House and Laura House are located in Skokie and the Brown CILA is in Evanston. The program consists of an array of services designed to meet the needs of each resident on a long-term basis. Staff support is available on a 24-hour basis. Residents attend one of Shore's day programs during the week.

The Patricia Lloyd Townhomes (PLT) in Evanston and scattered-site apartments in Evanston and Skokie comprise Shore's Supported Living Arrangements (SLA) program. The PLT are a row of five two-story units, each housing two individuals that are available to adults who are able to live more independently. Eight individuals live in the homes and most are employed in the community. Residents are responsible for themselves and their homes.

A House Manager resides in one unit to provide support as needed. The scattered-site apartment residents have intermittent contact with staff. Services are on an as-needed basis and training includes: budgeting, housekeeping, cooking, shopping, transportation, interpersonal counseling and case management.

In-Home Respite Care eases some of the stress families endure when they are the sole caregivers of a family member with a developmental disability. In-home training is provided that assists respite recipients with communication, self-care and social skills while enabling the primary caregiver to leave the home. Objectives are developed with the input from the individual, family members and staff, which are part of an individualized program plan. A family is usually assigned one respite worker to assure continuity. Hours for respite can range from a few hours every week, to weekends or additional hours as needed.

Service Facilitation is provided for those individuals who are enrolled in the Illinois Home Base Support Services program. The program is designed to help individuals with developmental disabilities maintain community placement within their family home. Shore's Service Facilitator provides case management and support for the individuals and their families including: identifying and assisting linkage to identified service needs for the person served. In addition, each individual is assigned a Personal Support Worker to assist them with their goals, which may focus on health, budgeting and other life skills.

- 75 individuals received services.
- 8 new Home Based Support cases were open for a total of 31 served. As a result of the program expansion, a Personal Support Worker was hired to help serve our growing caseload at the Patricia Lloyd Townhomes.
- The Laura House CILA was able to provide emergency respite service to a woman with a moderate/severe intellectual disability who later became a resident. Shore accepted a male to fill a vacancy in the Jean F. Karger CILA. Both residents have adjusted well to the transition to their new homes.
- As part of the health and wellness initiative, residents are encouraged to eat healthy balanced meals and to exercise regularly. Nine residents participated in Park District fitness classes and are members of the Levy Center Fitness Room and four residents were in the Special Olympics. Four residents receive meals through the Meals at Home Program several times per week to insure they are receiving proper nutrition.
- A bathroom was remodeled at the Laura House CILA through a Village of Skokie Community Development Block Grant and a grant from the USG Foundation supported the SLA Program.

Shore Homes

Twelve residents each reside at the Buehler House/Shore Homes East in Evanston and Shore Homes West in Skokie. The group homes are 24-hour staff supported living environments, as similar as possible to life in mainstream society. Residents are encouraged to interact with their community and to learn to become less dependent on others. All residents are engaged in daytime employment, training or senior leisure programming.

- 24 residents received services during the year.
- Kindness Program was reinstated. Residents receive rewards at the end of the week for good behavior such as pizza night, treasure box rewards, donuts, etc.
- Healthy living, with an emphasis on diet and exercise, continues to be in the forefront of all the residential programs. The residents exercise by riding the stationary bike, using the treadmill, walking in the community, and attending YMCA, Special Olympics and ZUMBA classes.
- Both group homes have a gardening club where the residents are responsible for watering the garden and seeing that the vegetables and herbs are added to meals. This year tomatoes, dill, cucumbers, corn, peppers, zucchini and an array of herbs was grown.
- Community integration outings took place during the year with trips to Wild West Town, Lambs Farm, Tommy Guns Garage, China Town, Odyssey Cruise, etc. New in-house activities included: pet therapy, music therapy, social worker group therapy and group barbeques together with both homes. Both homes passed all public health inspections.

Administrative Fundraising & Highlights

Since 1951, fundraising has played a key component in Shore's ability to offer the highest quality programs and services and to expand these offerings as the need arises. It is through the generosity of time, in-kind donations and financial support that has helped create the organization we are today.

- 20th Annual Golf Outing held at the Deerfield Golf Club in Riverwoods on Friday, July 18, 2014. 110 golfers attended making this the largest turnout of golfers in Shore's golf history. The event netted \$13,272.
- Annual Appeal set a new record with over \$180,000 received from 341 donors.
- In December 2014, Shore purchased a former Village of Skokie Municipal Building at 8350 Laramie Avenue, Skokie, which will be the future home for the Adult Services Program. Its business office at 4232 Dempster Street was sold in January 2015 and staff relocated to the second floor of Laramie in February.
- Annual Spring Benefit called "When I'm 64" featuring entertainment by American English took place at Viper Alley on Saturday, March 21, 2015.
 A net of over \$86,000 was realized making this event one of the top five highest netting events in Shore's history.
- 218 volunteers provided 8,123 hours of service.
- Annual Meeting was held at Hackney's on Lake in Glenview on Tuesday, June 15, 2015, and featured numerous award presentations. Longtime Board Members Donna Brown and Elizabeth Karlson received a Distinguished Service Award for their exemplary service to Shore for over 20 years. Both are now members of Shore's Honorary Board of Directors. In addition, Shore employees listed were recognized for having 10 or more years of service as of June 30, 2015. 
