Nearly 200 guests attended the Roaring 20s themed event that honored Susie and Joel Blau. David Lloyd, Board Vice President, presented the Blaus with the Thomas and Lois Lloyd Humanitarian Award, named after his parents and our founders; this is the highest recognition given for one's commitment to our mission of improving the quality of life for individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities.

Joel graduated from Evanston Township High School (ETHS) in 1977 and Susie graduated in 1976 from Highland Park High School. They have been active Shore supporters since they met and became friends of David Lloyd at Drake University in 1977. They soon became close with the Lloyd Family, spending time in Evanston with late founders, and David's family, Dan and Martha, as well as the late Ann, and the Roberts family.

Susie, who holds a Master degree in Behavioral Psychology, was co-founder of the kindergarten enrichment program, Extraordinary Kids, and Joel co-founded MEDIQUS Asset Advisors, both in 1996. They have both since retired and enjoy spending their time with their family here and in Boulder, Colorado. As proud parents, parents-in-law, and grandparents of four, they look forward to continuing to help Shore reach its short and long term objectives.

Susie served on Shore's Board of Directors from 1988-1991. Together, Joel and Susie continue to support the agency's growth as they have for over the last 45 years.

Another award recipient was Jerrold "Jerry" Berg. Meridith Adams, Board President, presented him with the President's Award for the nearly 45 years of achievements he has made while maintaining his independent living.

Jerry is a resident at the Patricia Lloyd Townhomes in Evanston, and is a recipient of Home Based Services, which enables him to be his own guardian.

"The staff comes over every Wednesday and helps me do budgeting, checks, and manage my medicine and my shots," says Jerry. "They take me to the bank, grocery shopping, and other errands. They treat me very well and I'm very happy with them!"

Jerry currently works at Mariano's as a Bagger. He worked at Home Depot for 18 years, Goodwill, and did light cleaning at Shore's Administration Center for several year while he received Job Coaching from the Supported Employment Program. "I love to work" Jerry says. In his free time, Jerry likes to travel, volunteer and enjoys sports.


